

Kingston Local History Room is moving soon – ALL CHANGE!!

Kingston Archives are still packing up to move from the end of July but their destination has probably (!) changed. The local Surrey Comet reports that a home has been found for them in the basement at Kingston Guildhall but details are sketchy and the Local History team have been told nothing!

They are **closing at 5pm on Friday 1st August 2014** however but the timing and location of the re-opening are currently not known.

WW1 and Richmond Park

A small display of WW1 pictures and photographs will be displayed in the entrance to Pembroke Lodge from August this year.

The Park was home to a number of army encampments, including a large camp near Roehampton for volunteer rifle regiments, a depot for the Royal Naval Air Service and a unit of the The Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC). Soldiers had battle training in the Park and the cavalry practised charges across the grasslands. A military hospital was built there for South African troops and a magazine called the *Springbok Blue* was written and published by patients, staff and volunteers. Examples of the magazine can be seen in the Hearsam Collection (www.hearsamcollection.org.uk). Intriguingly, the Pen Ponds were used by Harry Grindall Matthews, an inventor, in his demonstration of an 'electrical light ray' weapon system, to be used against Zeppelins.

Next year, 27th- 29th March 2015 I am going on a short visit to the Somme WW1 battlefields area led by David Harrison, a former history teacher and amateur war historian (Western Front Asscn), and I'm wondering if anyone else would be interested in coming too. There's room for about 15 I think but David has plenty of 'regulars' so I've booked early.


I've been on a number of David's trips and can recommend them highly. He drives us in a mini-bus to all the significant places and tells us their stories - battlefields and cemeteries, dressing stations, trenches, command posts etc. I've been on this trip before and experienced the 'mud' at first hand! Visits to sites of your own particular interest by arrangement with David. We stay at a simple IBIS hotel for 2 nights. Tour, one evening meal and b&b in a Single Room £400; Tour, one evening meal, b&b Sharing a Room £350 each, other arrangements up to you and David. Departs from Sutton/Ewell.

FIELDWORK

A walk in Streatham with the Streatham Society, guided by local historian John Brown. (St Leonard's is at postcode SW16 1HS)

The modern parish is shown below from www.achurchnearyou.com/ with St Leonard's marked with a blue pin, but the ancient parish was considerably larger.



Our walk focussed on a few roads around St Leonard's church, starting at the church itself. A chapel is recorded on this spot in the Domesday Book (1066) worth '8 shillings' and probably the size of a double garage. The building today is part 14th century (the tower) and the rest was rebuilt 1831. There have been two serious fires since, the latest in 1975. St Leonard is the patron saint of prisoners and midwives!



The graveyard is the 'village'

graveyard and the earliest stone dates from the 1730s. Some 50,000 burials have taken place here since 1538, hence the elevation of the churchyard above the surrounding area. Some of the tombs have heavy slabs to deter grave-robbers.






Streatham Green, now much reduced in size, is the original village green, and it features the Dyce Fountain, named after William Dyce, a famous pre-Raphaelite artist who came to live in Bedford House in the 1850s, and who was buried at St Leonards. It is a Listed Building but sadly needs £25,000 for repairs.

The Broadway, in Streatham High Road, is a row of fine houses built in 1888. John showed us a Victorian drawing of the

houses and here is a modern day photograph.



These houses provide evidence of WW1 bombing. The house carrying the 'Broadway' sign was damaged in a WW1 air raid but only the 'Broad...' part of the sign survived and was re-instated.



Our tour finished with the story of another famous resident, George Pratt, who moved to Streatham from Mitcham in the 19th century and set up a successful retail business that evolved into the 'Pratts' department store, later part of the John Lewis chain. George Pratt made most of his wealth from his purchase of the Bedford House and Estate, however. He died in the 1880s and was buried at St Leonards.


- a wreath-laying service at Glasgow's Cenotaph following the special service for Commonwealth leaders at Glasgow Cathedral
- an event at the Commonwealth War Graves Commission St Symphorien Military Cemetery in Mons, Belgium – which has an equal number of British and German soldiers, and is where the first and last Commonwealth casualties of the war are believed to be buried
- a candlelit vigil of prayer and penitence at Westminster Abbey finishing at 11pm – the moment war was declared.

And it says:

The centre-piece of the commemorations will be the reopening of the Imperial War Museum (IWM) London following the £35 million refurbishment of the First World War galleries. A Source from the Society's Research Collection

RESEARCH AND ADVICE

The Society's extensive Research Collection is the main feature at the centre and there are computers and fiche viewers which can be used to view some of the material. Use of computers and access to the Internet will be free for personal genealogical research but users will have to pay their own fees to any commercial sites such as the PRO 1901 Census site. PRO vouchers, at a reduced price for members, will be available at the centre. The Super Name Index is available for use by visitors.

The Research Collection has been catalogued and saved as PDF files which can be viewed with Adobe Acrobat Reader. The files will open in a new window.



So, what kinds of research items are there?

I picked a volume at random from the shelves. A red cover hardback called '**Pile's Sutton Cheam and District Directory 1935**'. About an inch thick with 'Buy Your Car from COOK's Motors Ltd, Brighton Road, Sutton. Phone Sutton 3800' stamped on the page edges and 'Darleydale Laundry Ltd for Family Work 39 High Street Sutton Telephone: Sutton 925 and 3650' on the back cover.

HERRINGTON'S DOWN QUILTS ARE GOOD VALUE

It has 538 pages and there are three b/w photographs. One of the shop front of W Lewis Hind & Sons, in High Street Sutton, the second is an interior of Kay and Francis showing a range of shop fittings and the third shows the ladies hard at work in the Hand Ironing Department at the Darleydale Laundry Ltd. There are also a few sketches like the Shopping Centre above.

Otherwise it is a regular 'District Directory containing Street Arrangement and Alphabetical lists for Sutton, Cheam, Banstead and Burgh Heath, together with a list of the principal residents in Ewell, Kingswood, Tadworth, Walton on the Hill and Woodmansterne'. For each place there is a history, the municipal structure including details of cemeteries, the names of the Municipal Officers, a list of the schools and number of pupils, the churches and their brief histories, details of railway station, gas and electric services, banks, postal services, police, cinemas, garages for motorists, sporting facilities, and hospitals. The local MPs, Council Officers, court officials and Hospital board members are named. The contact names for local clubs and societies are listed.

Then the streets are listed alphabetically and then the principal resident, and trade or business names, for each number in the street is named. The pages are laced with many advertisements.

How can we use this for family history?

It's good for names of course, although you only get one for each household, and it can help locate a particular person or business at a point in time. This directory is for

1935 so it paints a peaceful picture prior to the disruption and destruction of WW2. Think '*Hercule Poirot*'. If your family member is listed you can get a sense of their neighbourhood and their role in the community. You can narrow down which school or church might have records of interest to you and where they might have worked. If your ancestor was a tradesperson or shop owner you might find an advertisement.

So a source of detail and colour about our ancestors' lives.

The IHGS, in partnership with Ancestry, have made their parish maps from the Atlas and Index of Parish Registers available on the Ancestry website. The new collection is entitled **Great Britain, Atlas and Index of Parish Registers**

Findmypast.co.uk has announced that it has bought **Origins.net**, whose records include the National Wills Index. Origins collections will be integrated into findmypast over the next few months. It has also purchased **Mocavo.com**.

The **Irish Genealogical Research Society** has launched a searchable *1901 Index to Townlands* on its website, IrishAncestors.ie. The 1901 Index is a key resource for identifying all land divisions in Ireland.

The index cards currently being digitised by the **International Prisoners-of-War Agency**, set up by the Red Cross, will be available online in August of this year.

Ancestry has recently announced it is ending a number of its businesses, including genealogy.com and all its Y-DNA and mtDNA tests.

The 'enhanced' Irish civil registration indexes of births, marriages and deaths – the versions that have long been used by GRO staff – were launched on **IrishGenealogy.ie** on Thursday 3 July.
